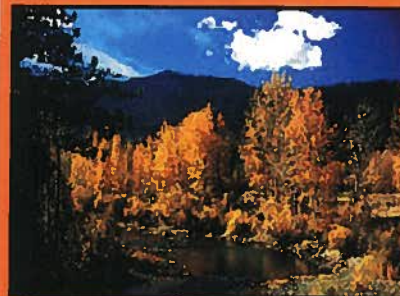

Managing Challenging Family Law Cases

September 27 — 30, 2010

This program, co-sponsored with the National Judicial College is for any judge who hears family law cases involving the dissolution of marriages, child custody and visitation, and child support. The faculty provides practice-based tools to assist judges in the management of the most complex issues in domestic relations. After attending this course, participants will be able to effectively interview children; apply the latest social science research to craft developmentally appropriate parenting plans; utilize problem-solving court principles to provide litigation alternatives to families in crisis; effectively manage high-conflict cases; ensure safety in cases where domestic violence is indicated; confidently evaluate business financial records; and assess business valuations.

Questions and Answers

Q – What is the Registration Fee for Core College and Managing Challenging Family Law Cases?

A – Core College **\$420**; Managing Challenging Family Law Cases: **\$985**. There is an additional a **\$235** Activity Fee for each course which includes provided meals, coffee breaks, and program materials.

Q – Where will I stay while in Reno for the Core College or Managing Challenging Family Law Cases?

A – Hotel guestrooms are available at the Silver Legacy Resort and Casino, located at 407 North Virginia Street. Single and double accommodations at the Silver Legacy are available at a rate of \$69 and are subject to state and local taxes. Q – Where will Core College and Managing Challenging Family Law Cases be held?

A – This program will convene at the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges' headquarters located at 1041 North Virginia Street, located approximately six blocks from the Silver Legacy. Transportation will be provided to and from the hotel.

Q – Will there be any meals provided during the training?

A – Yes, your Activity Fee will cover a continental breakfast each day (M-TH/F) and lunch on Monday and Wednesday. Coffee breaks will also be included.

Q – When does the program begin and end?

A – Registration will be held at the training location at 7:30 a.m. Monday, September 27, 2010. Managing Challenging Family Law will end at 5 p.m. on September 30, 2010; while Core College will end at noon on October 1, 2010.

Q – Can I receive continuing education credits?

A – The trainings are approved for CLE/CEU credits in most states; a signed form will be available at the conclusion of the training. Certificates of completion are given only to those present during the entire session. In addition, both are eligible for credits under the Masters of Judicial Studies Program.

Q – Will there be a social activity?

A – Yes, information about the social activity will be announced at a later date.

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
